

Mobile media have changed the way we work and live imperceptibly, but at the same time fundamentally, and present media studies with new challenges. Research in mobile media studies requires mobile methods and practice theories as more and more epistemic, social and material things become networked and smart, as infrastructures are rendered visible, and as digital technologies increasingly become assistive, wearable and context-aware. To the same extent as there is no longer any difference between *going online* and *being online*, the cooperative a priori of media becomes the focus of attention: Media are created through cooperation and, simultaneously, serve as a condition for cooperation and corporation by the agency of actors.

The annual meeting of the DFG research training group 'Locating Media' will attempt to unleash the underlying potential for exchanges between media studies, social theory, science and technology studies, and research in mobile human-computer interaction and computer-supported cooperative work. The questions addressed include whether media-supported mobility is inevitably constituted as co-mobility, or to what extent all forms of mapping, navigation and knowledge production are, and always have been, based in the co-operative qualities of mobile media.

This will be discussed in 4 sections: (1) whilst taking into account ethnomethodological assumptions on the cooperative and situative conditions for action in motion; (2) with a focus on the epistemic qualities of historic and current mobile mappings; (3) considering data mobilities and logistical lives; and (4) by analyzing concrete mobile situations.
